Pleasing All the People All the Time? publisher's note

Not in Eldorado!

When we decided to create our magazine three years ago, we had already been living here for about six months. We were well aware, therefore, of Eldorado's reputation for having more than a few independent thinkers---people who not only marched to the beat of their own drums but were eager proselytizers for their strongly held opinions.

Leaving aside the infamous imbroglios over chickens, reclaimed asphalt pavement, and ground-based solar panels, it's a time-tested truism that in Eldorado almost anything can create controversy. A couple of stories illustrate the point. An Eldorado business owner sets out a plate of home-baked cookies for his customers but is then confronted by an angry patron who has detected sugar as an ingredient: "What are you trying to do, kill us all?". Wildlife advocates place tasteful, non-obtrusive signs around the neighborhood to remind people to be careful not to run over snakes. Some residents immediately lodge complaints that the signs are "visual pollution." In Eldorado, it sometimes seems, no good deed goes unpunished.

So when *Eldorado Living* was launched, we knew there would be pushback. But surprisingly, virtually all of the commentary has been supportive, and even the critical input has generally been thoughtful and helpful. But we did get one scourging email that is *so Eldorado* that it practically cries out to be in print:

"I never asked to receive Eldorado Living. It is not what we read, it is not what it means to be, it is not what we want because it does not promote community but instead provides self promoting spaces for the very few which need self-promotion. It is 37 pages of advertising and, within these pages there are two pages of self promotion...

...I was looking into the website of N2 Publishing and did not find anything there supporting, or related to, northern New Mexico history or values. Their self advertising only tells the story of people engaged in money making, the culture of the Neoliberal Economic Model that has been devastating community, undermining American Values and most of all, sickening and killing life in our planet. The website does not mention what their carbon footprint is, which I believe is huge. Especially with a magazine that serves to destroy forests and poison our lives with the inks it uses and which needs to be transported to mailboxes of people who did not ask for it...

...Your magazine is an insult to our intelligence and to Eldorado's history and community. So, please, take me off your bloody mailing list."

We did.



For the record, *Eldorado Living* is fully recyclable and, if you prefer, you may receive a digital version. We love our sponsors because without them this magazine couldn't come to residents for free.

We, too, march to the beat of our own drum. And we thank our loyal readers for following along.

I am the artist owner of the Victoria de Almeida Studio on the Historic Santa Fe Plaza. I also do occasional graphic art and business consulting for several businesses on the Plaza. My heart, however, will always place me smack dab in the middle of a palette of paint in front of a canvas.

What are your family's favorite activities?

My husband loves mountain biking and hiking in

the Eldorado preserves. We love traveling. I love anything creative: painting, sewing, jewelry making, etc. I've always loved writing since I was a teenager. I have recently started writing again on an online writers site called Wattpad. My book has over 8,000 reads and counting! 

Avenida Eldorado that we coveted last summer are now waving in the wind on our very own

property. But pet owners need to beware of the ferocious Foxtail plant. This is serious stuff people, so listen up.

At the Farmers Market we picked the brains of a few Master Gardeners who gave us the skinny on Foxtail Grass. The barbed seed heads of the plant can get into animals skin, nose, toes, ears or wherever it can latch on. Between the toes is a prime spot. These hard to find seeds also are hard to break down and can cause serious infection or even death in your pet. Dogs who roam the grassy greenbelts with noses down are especially prone to seed attacks.

Eldorado resident Dr. Julie Breer, of Smith Veterinary Hospital says, "We are seeing a bumper crop of foxtails this year due to all the moisture and now warming temperatures. Prevention is always the best course of action.

First, familiarize yourself with the appearance of these pesky grass seeds. Next, avoid exposing your pets to them by not walking in areas where they grow. If you have a yard full of them it will end up being less painful to have a landscaper remove them, than all the visits to the vet.

Foxtails are designed to imbed in the ground, but are even happier to become stuck in our pets. The most common places we remove them from, are in the ears and eyes, up the nose and between the toes.

Removing foxtails can sometimes require multiple sedations, as they tend to migrate in the tissues.

If you see your pet repeatedly shaking their head, sneezing, licking their feet, have them checked out by your vet."





Captive and Cousins: Slavery, Kinship and Community in the Southwest Borderlands

We just love the team at Pecos National Historic Park, as well as their well-curated gift shop featuring a great selection of fiction and non-fiction books about New Mexico. Ranger Eric Sainio's top pick is:

Captive and Cousins: Slavery, Kinship, and Community in the Southwest Borderlands by James F. Brooks illustrates the complex and nuanced history of New Mexico through historical documentation of slave-taking, indentured servitude and economic raids. Through the lens of slavery, Brooks looks at the economic, martial ples experienced across the plains, the mountains and into Mexico.

Brooks consistently points out that slavery in the Southwest Borderlands demonstrated many differences from that of other areas, such as the American South. Instances of repatriation, inclusion, or outright repayment of debt allowed slaves within many of these societies to become free citizens. These captives were often granted protections that did not exist elsewhere, yet remained in a status of servitude. Examples abound of Spanish censuses where out reference to their origin or parenthood.

In a series of chapters, Brooks speaks to the specific circumstances on the Plains, within the Pueblos, around Spanish settlements and across the Borderlands where economic success, personal status and imperial rules dictated how they raided, profited, enslaved others and included former slaves into their communities. Captives and Cousins thereby paints the expansion, growth, and changes of New Mexico from the Spanish period up to its inclusion into the United States as a creation of multifaceted societies through violence, slavery, adaptation, and ultimately, kinship with one another.

strates how much of the economic position and prosperity of the peoples of New Mexico relied on trade and theft not only of material possessions, but also of people. In this recounting, slaves represented a repayment of debt, an indication of prosperity and a tradable good to return to one's people back home. Raids and counter-raids led to personal wealth and contributed to the number of people kept in captivity.

Following is a suggested flight of Portal Wines for your summer enjoyment. Drink them alone or pair with any meat and fish, paté, spicy southeast Asian cuisine, creamy cheeses and vegetarian fare.

Breton Vouvray Brut La Dilet-

tante, a non-vintage Loire Valley sparkling wine produced from 100% Chenin Blanc, biodynamically farmed and vinified in the traditional Champagne method. This easy-drinking sparkler is crisp, dry, with flavors of apple and a savory ginger finish.

2016 Vouvray La Craie, a Loire Valley production released by Lionel Gauthier and Jon-David Headrick. Vouvray La Craie is 100% Chenin Blanc, farmed sustainably on limey,

clay soils and vinified as a light demi-sec wine (8-12 g residual sugar), with no exposure to wood. Intended to be consumed young, it is patently crisp with a hint of sweetness; an excellent introduction to Chenin Blanc!

Quinta Essentia 2016 Chenin

Blanc, is a South African wine produced from old vine Chenin Blanc planted on mountain slopes surrounding Stellenbosch. This Chenin Blanc presents aromas of apple, caramel and nuts, followed by a richly textured palate of lush tropical fruit tied together by taut minerality and balanced acidity.





A Rich History



WHO YOU GONNA CALL? COMPOSTERS!

Way out here in the dry, brown southwest, composting is much more challenging than just tossing and turning some green and brown waste in a big pile out back. But there is hope! The Eldorado 285 Recycles non-profit group, (E285R), has been promoting "straw bale vermi-composting" since 2012 and has had great success. They have installed 175 compost systems for Hwy 285 corridor residents so far and are hoping to make 200 by 2020!!

Using the help of some energetic little red wiggler worms (Eisenia Fetida, to be exact), a few bales of straw and lots of yummy kitchen veggie waste, you can turn your kitchen waste into a rich compost within a few months. This diverts hundreds of pounds of waste from the landfill and septic waste streams, annually.

There is no need for fancy rotating drums or layered lasagna composting methods, nor a need to worry about a perfect brown-to-green ratio. Worms do all the work. They eat, they poo, they eat, they poo, okay, they "cast" to be scientific! They multiply like rabbits, which speeds up the composting process even more. Don't even think of buying commercial worm castings again! You can grow your own little worm nursery. All you have to do is keep feeding these little wigglers your veggie waste and occasionally moisten the bin.

Imagine... 6 bales of straw arranged on the ground to form a rectangular border surrounding your "worm bin." This bin is the empty cavity inside, which is filled with loose moistened straw from a 7th bale. Add one heaping, hearty, helping of your kitchen waste under the loose straw, top it with a fresh batch of starter worms, cover with loose straw, and "forget about it"...until the next time you have collected enough waste to add to the bin, say, a couple weeks later.

Harvest time! After a few months, dig back down to where you originally started and you will discover....Voila! Your food waste is gone, and only rich black dirt remains. One tried and true method of harvesting this fresh soil is using a screen method. Excavate the soil and shovel it over a ¼ inch grid screen into a wheelbarrow. Any worms and un-processed organics will remain on top and only the soil will drop through the screen. Then dump any unscreened material and worms back into your compost. Yes, some worms will sneak through and that is fine to have some juicy worms in your garden. You might consider adding a second layer of screen, a 1/8 inch grid, and that will then catch most of your baby worms. You can use your new compost directly in your garden, or create a concoction with horse/goat manure, native soil, and/or other organic fertilizers.

The E285R compost crew offers free installation of these straw bale vermi-compost systems. The only costs are for the straw bales and a modest delivery charge. The starter worms, like a good sourdough starter, have been passed down from compost to compost, acclimated to our climate, and they are provided for free. Their ancient ancestors were bred from Sam's Organic Soil Yard in Santa Fe.

Even if you do not garden, compost anyway! Just for the sake of recycling your organic waste. Spread the harvested soil around trees or bushes like you would do with fertilizer.



Vista Grande Public Library By Katrina Wolff, Resident

Julia Kelso is the Library Director at the Vista Grande Public Library. She is originally from Wyoming and ran a six-and-a-half branch library in Big Horn County before coming to the Vista Grande Public Library. She studied history at the University of New Mexico, where her love of New Mexico began. Julia has an M.A. in Folklore from Memorial University of Newfoundland and Labrador and an MLIS from the University of Washington.

The Vista Grande Public Library is conveniently located within the Eldorado community on Avenida Torreon, part of the county campus between the El Dorado Community School and the Adam Senior Center. Celebrating 20 years in the neighborhood, the library continues to be a vision of forward-looking people. The library serves Eldorado, the 285 corridor, Lamy, Galisteo, Glorieta, Pecos and Rowe. It is capably run by a paid staff of just three, two of whom are part-time. Julia, Library Assistant Tracey and Library Aide Mary who oversee the many volunteers without whom the library couldn't function.

The Vista Grande Public Library catalog has 35,000 items for adults, teens and children, with new fiction, non-fiction and large print books coming in every month. The library rounds out its offerings with graphic novels, audiobooks, DVDs, newspapers, magazines, puzzles, games, telescopes and baking pans! During regular business hours, the library has computers available for public use and free wifi.

Included in the library space are various locations where local artists display their 2-D and 3-D works, a children's activity area that hosts a weekly Story Time, a youth room which hosts the Wags and Words program which encourages reluctant readers to read out loud to the Reading Education Assistance Dogs, computer stations, quiet cubbies for study and a community room. The Community Room a hub of activity most days of the week. After school programs, the Chess Club, monthly Family Movie Night, occasional Grown-Up Movie Night, book club groups, the Eldorado Genealogy group, the Santa Fe Stargazers and many lectures and forums keep the Community Room active and interesting. Among the regular presentations are a monthly Medicare information forum and park presenters who bring special program

through the cooperative relationship with Pecos National Historic Site.

Vista Grande Public Library is supported by grants and donations, with about 55% of the yearly operating budget sourced through donations and fundraisers. The Board of Directors and other Friends of the Library organize outreach activities and events. The first Saturday morning of every month is Book Donation Day, which seeds the bi-annual (May and November) Book Sales, as well as providing additional titles to the library's circulating collection.

This year marks the library's 20th anniversary and their annual Summer Social fund-raiser is scheduled for Sunday, August 11. Beginning at 1 pm at the ECIA Community Center, the Summer Social will offer all-you-can-eat ice cream, music and auctions, both silent and live. Join us to support our library, visit the silent auction and stay for the second annual live auction! As the library continues to provide opportunities for learning and partnering with local educational organizations, Maketime will be offering acitivites for children of all ages!





We used the services of Carol Olmstead, owner of Feng Shui for Real Life on our home and offices, and it made a noticeable difference. Carol provides residential and business consulting as well as workshops and training nationwide.

Carol, tell us how important is Feng Shui when selling a house?

Feng Shui is the art and science of arranging your surroundings in balance and harmony with the natural world. We all know how it feels to walk into a space that feels wonderful, in contrast to walking into a space where you can't wait to leave. Feng Shui staging helps sell a house because people immediately feel like this is a space they want to make their own.

What can be done to the front of the house for maximum curb appeal?

The front door is the "mouth of chi" in Feng Shui because that's where all good energy and wealth enters your home. If you have a wood door that's fine because it represents growth. But check your door frequently, and repair or replace it if it's cracked, chipped, or faded. Also, replace your doormat on a regular basis because it will also fade and look worn. Trim back bushes and clear away dead lives, pull weeds, and prune overgrown plants.

What sector of the house should sellers focus on?

Standing at your front door and looking in to the house, the Helpful People sector is located in the lower right area, which is activated by metal objects. This is a good spot for a small, decorative metal box with an affirmation inside that speaks to attracting the perfect buyer. For example, it could say: "I now attract the perfect buyer at the perfect price."

Is there a Feng Shui application for getting a good deal or to help cultivate a smooth transaction?

To attract a smooth transaction, clear the way for buyers to find the house. That means no obstructions on the path to your front door. Also, the most abundant path is one that gently curves, rather than a straight line (called a "poison arrow") to your door. If you have a straight path, plant or place colorful flowers or bushy plants along the sides of the path to symbolically curve it.

Tell us about the use of mirrors in Feng Shui?

A mirror can attract or repel energy. I'll use a mirror when we want to bring in a great view, or symbolically "move out" a wall

to correct the shape of a home. My most important tip is to avoid hanging a mirror directly across from the front door because it will send the positive energy (and buyers) back out the door instead of drawing it into the home.

What about the decluttering and depersonalizing process?

Buyers want to visualize their possessions fitting into your home. That's why it's important to clear clutter and make your home feel spacious. You also don't want them forming opinions about you to use to lower their offer. So remove family photos, as well as items that tell buyers too much about your history and lifestyle. Move these into temporary storage.






